Last month I mentioned the Council auction, of the 90 lots put up 89 were sold with Council making a surprising \$465,000. Very successful!

One of the projects Council has been recently working on and is almost complete is the Jundah depot security gates. Moving forward any members of the public wishing to gain access to the depot for reasons such as private works will be required to sign in at the Works and Services office. At this point, the Miles St gate will be opened from the office to enable members of the public to enter the depot. Please note whilst walking around in the depot you will be required to wear high vis clothing and closed in shoes. If you don't have a high vis vest, one can be borrowed as you are signing in and returned when you sign out. Council appreciates your co-operation.

The following is an update of our work crews and their progress on roads around the Shire.

Ronnie Rayment's crew have recently completed flood damaged on the Nappa Merrie Rd and are currently doing a resheet on Arrabury Rd.

Jason Beilby's crew are continuing Palparara Davenport Road which they will return to in the New Year. The section of Jundah Winton Rd that was recently put to tender has been awarded and works are due to commence mid-January.

The contractor crew have completed medium formation grading on the Windorah Bedourie Rd and are now doing shoulders on the Jundah Longreach Rd.

The maintenance grader has completed Tonkoro, Connemara Rd's and Lochiel and Lina Glen Rds.

If there are sections of roads requiring immediate attention, please notify the Council.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

Councils collaborate on collateral for disaster preparedness

Five Councils in Queensland's Central West have partnered to develop a disaster preparedness flipbook that will be distributed free of charge to residents and visitors.

Funding for the flipbook was provided by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) and strengthens the efforts of local governments to prepare their communities for the onset of natural disaster events.

Barcaldine Regional Council, Barcoo Shire Council, Blackall-Tambo Regional Council, Longreach Regional Council and Winton Shire Council have been involved in the production of this excellent resource. The flipbook has been developed by Craig Neuendorf and Donna Rowlands from the Longreach Regional Council with assistance provided by Hailey Winter and Angela Waugh from Barcaldine Regional Council, Joelene Barwick from Barcoo Shire Council, Andrea Saunders from Blackall-Tambo Regional Council and Melissa Doyle from the Winton Shire Council.

The flipbook addresses the most common natural disaster events which occur in the Central West. It contains information about flooding, severe storms, bushfires, heatwaves and pandemics. The flipbook also informs residents and visitors how to prepare for these natural disaster events and the steps to take once the event has passed.

The flipbook was recently launched in Brisbane by Longreach Mayor Tony Rayner, Chair of RAPAD, and Brendan Moon, the Chief Executive Officer of Queensland Reconstruction Authority. Mayor Rayner says preparedness makes a big difference in times of disaster.

"Evidence shows us that communities are able to recover from natural disaster events more effectively when they're fully prepared" he said. "This flipbook supports such preparation."

The flipbook features photographs from all five Council areas depicting various disaster events and will be forwarded by mail to all households both urban and rural in all five Council areas for recipients to place on their fridge. Copies will also be made available for visitors and tourists at Visitor Information Centres in the five Council areas.

Cr Ingrid Miller Resignation

It is with regret that at yesterday's General Meeting of Barcoo Shire Council, Cr Ingrid Miller submitted her resignation from Council, effective 20 January 2021.

With the resignation coming in the first 12 months from the last quadrennial election and in accordance with the Local Government Act 2009, Council has the option to fill the vacancy by either: 1. by election, or; 2. following the procedure in Section 166A of the Local Government Act 2009 to fill a particular vacancy i.e. by the CEO asking the electoral commission to give a vacancy notice to the runnerup in order of priority.

At yesterday's meeting, Council resolved to fill the vacancy in office of Cr Ingrid Miller by a byelection in accordance with Section 166 of the Local Government Act 2009.

Cr Ingrid Miller's statement follows:

Statement from Cr Ingrid Miller

Dear all residents and connections of the Barcoo Shire Community,

I wish to advise that due to personal and family reasons, I will be resigning from my role as Councillor with the Barcoo Shire Council effective 20 January 2021.

I am both deeply sorry and extremely regretful to be making this decision at such an early stage into my first term. This has been a very sudden and especially difficult decision to make, yet one that has not at all come lightly.

I have taken the role of Councillor with utmost privilege and I wholeheartedly apologise to the Barcoo community who showed me so much support at the March 2020 election. You put your trust in me and I have thoroughly enjoyed representing this fantastic part of the world during this short time. Council has been a highly rewarding experience and I am proud to say that having been elected as one of your Councillors has been one of the most honourable achievements of my life. QuickSmarts Drink Driving



Drink driving is one of the major killers on Queensland roads.

On average, 55 people are killed and 550 seriously injured each year on Queensland roads as a result of drink driving! Drinking alcohol reduces our ability to drive safely. Alcohol affects judgement, vision, coordination and reflexes, and increases the risk of crashing.

The facts

- In Queensland, Learner, Provisional and Probationary Licence holders are not permitted to drive after drinking any alcohol.
 They must have a zero blood/breath alcohol concentration (BAC) limit.
- Open licence holders must have a BAC lower than 0.05. The same applies for supervisors of car and motorcycle Learner drivers.
- . The following licence holders must also maintain a zero BAC when driving:
 - any vehicle weighing over 4.5 tonnes or an articulated motor vehicle (eg B-double or road train)
 - a bus built to carry more than 12 adults, including the driver
 - a vehicle carrying a placard load of dangerous goods
 - a taxi, limousine or public passenger vehicle
- a tow truck, pilot or escort vehicle escorting an oversized vehicle
- a vehicle being used by a driver trainer to give driver training or a specially constructed vehicle (including a tractor and motorcycle)
- a class RE licence holder in their first year of riding
- 16% of drivers get behind the wheel when they know they may be over the legal alcohol limit, and 20% drive the next morning when they're possibly over the legal limit?

The effects of alcohol on driving

Drinking alcohol can affect drivers and driving performance by:

- slowing down reaction time crucial in an emergency situation
- making it difficult to multi-task an essential skill for safe driving
- causing poor judgement affecting your ability to judge distance and speed
- reducing attention span so we don't notice other drivers and/or vehicles
- affecting vision and hearing reducing our ability to identify driving hazards
- creating over-confidence we may feel more confident after a few drinks but in fact, we're less able to cope with unexpected events. We might take risks that we normally wouldn't.

Why no alcohol is safer when it comes to driving

Blood/breath alcohol concentration (BAC) is a measure of the amount of alcohol in the body. Even at 0.05, studies show reactions are slower than at 0.0 BAC.

It's difficult to accurately monitor how much alcohol we consume due to:

- · the different size and shape of glasses
- · different alcohol content for each type of drink (wine/beer/spirits)
- · different volumes typically poured for each type of drink
- gradual alcohol impairment (the more we drink, the less accurate your guesses become about the amount of alcohol consumed).

It's also important to remember that BAC may continue to rise after we stop drinking. It's why we shouldn't rely on the result from a breath-testing machine in a hotel. Other variables that affect your BAC include weight, gender, metabolism, how often you drink, and how long since you have eaten. Coffee, sleep, vomiting or exercise will not reduce your BAC.

The only thing that reduces your BAC is time.

Plan ahead and stay safe

If you're going to drink, make arrangements to get home safely and avoid driving the morning after. Consider these options:

- Stay at a friend's place rather than drive
- Leave the car at home and consider alternative transport such as a taxi, ride share, courtesy bus, pre-arranged lift or public transport
- Designate a 'dry driver' if going out with others
- If hosting at your house, provide non-alcoholic drink options and plenty of food, offer guests somewhere to stay
 overnight rather than drive home, or call a taxi or ride share for them. Remember they may still be over the limit the
 next morning.
- If you're walking after drinking, walk with a sober friend or group, stay on the footpath, and only cross the road at marked crossings or under a street light where you're clearly visible to motorists.
