

## WITH SALLY O'NEIL CONTINUED

Councillors have been attending a series of workshops in preparation for the upcoming budget. We have been taking into consideration results from the community survey that was sent out earlier this year and will look to factor this in as we review our service levels. We look forward to delivering some key projects in the coming financial year across the shire.

The Local Disaster Management Group has held their meeting in Jundah this week where updates were provided from BoM, Rural Fire Service, Qld Fire and Emergency Services and Qld Health. The focus for Disaster Management in the region has shifted from wet weather and flooding to the potential risk of bush fires later in the year.

## The following is the externally funded project status update:

- Windorah water treatment plant repairs to Currareva line completed and plant running well.
- McPhellemy's crossing Due to recent wet weather event delays to be expected.
- Mt Felix floodway Project currently in progress
- Ray Paynter culvert/floodway scheduled to be completed before May/June
- Floodway Yaraka Retreat Rd near Trafalgar Project due to commence May
- Stonehenge water treatment plant new shed and filter upgrade plans are being finalised with procurement commencing.

## The following is an update of our work crews and their progress on roads around the Shire.

- Darren Mattheson's crew have relocated to Stonehenge and completing flood damage on the Depot Glen Rd and will then move to the Nildes Jump up to carry out rehabilitation.
- Jason Beilby's crew are continuing Windorah Bedourie Rd at Morney, seal date mid May.
- The maintenance grader is currently doing maintenance on the Windorah River Rd.If there are sections of roads requiring immediate attention, please notify Council.
- Contractor Crew are doing flood damage on the Jundah Winton Rd near Warbreccan.
- Flying gang have started the main roads sign upgrade on the Windorah Birdsville Rd.



Don't forget, Council meetings are open to the public and all community members are welcome. Council meetings are rotated around the three towns, and we notify via an online flyer of upcoming Council meeting dates and times. The next meeting will be held in Windorah on the 17th of May 2023.

## **TOWN SERVICES REPORTS**

• Council approved the future use of the Jundah Pound Paddock on the following basis: 1. That the sole purpose of the paddock will be for use by council to impound stock in accordance with local laws or agist stock in emergency situations on application and approval from the CEO. In accordance with Section 254(1)(b) of the Local Government Regulations, 2012, the reason for this decision is: The secondary recommendation fails to provide for the practical use of the impound paddock during times of emergency or other broader community needs.



## **DAME EDNA'S GLADIOLUS**

Last Sunday Gladiolus were weeping in honour the passing of the Aussie icon that made the Gladiolus a household name around the world. It was so sad to hear of the death of the great Australian comic Barry Humphries. His alter ego Dame Edna Everage became an international star was rarely photographed without clutching a bunch of her favourite flowers the Gladiolus before tossing them to her audience after a stage performance.

The Gladioli would be one of the best know plant in Australia. It is a part of a group of ornamental perennial flowering plants in the Iris family. These plants grow from a corm, which is a thick underground stem that stores food and resembles a flattened bulb. Though most gardeners still refer to the corm as the Gladioli Bulb. Gladiolus are best known for producing some of the world's most prized

perennial flowers.











Naturally Gladiolus are very slender plants so planting in clusters will enhance the flowering display. Gladioli are perfect to be grown in clusters or individually spread throughout the beds. They are great companions with perennial plants like as Daises, Lilies and annuals like Salvias.

The tall brightly coloured Gladioli have been favourites in Central Queensland gardens for over 100 years. These tall Gladioli can reach a height of up to 2m high. Always providing a beautiful display and when in a vase inside the display is just as impressive.

In recent years a number of dwarf Gladioli hybrids have become available. These compact hybrids will only grow up to a 1m high and are suitable for smaller gardens or growing in pots.

Gladioli are available in just about every colour and shade and even multicolour varieties. These colours come in anything from the traditional white and red through to coral, musk and hot pinks, tangerine, lemon, plum and deep purple. The flowers are typically arranged on only one side of the stem and open in succession from the bottom up, with the largest flower at the base. Some hybrids the flower petals can be frilly others can be ruffled or semi-ruffled adding a contrast to the plain petals.

The flower size of the Gladioli flowers can in size depending on the hybrid. The largest induvial flower I have ever seen was over 10cm in diameter and the smallest and the miniature flowering hybrids whose flowers are just over 5cm in diameter.

There was also a mix of new hybrid Gladiolus as well as numerous heirloom Gladiolus. Inquiring about the plants I was told that after each flowering season had finished many of the gardeners of Monto would dig up the Gladioli Bulbs for storage.

Western Queensland gardeners are still growing a mix of new hybrid Gladiolus as well as numerous heirloom Gladiolus. After each flowering season had finished many gardeners in Western Queensland dig up the Gladioli Bulbs for storage.

The process would include digging the bulbs up, washing the bulbs, placing the bulbs in old Onion bags then storing in a dry place away from vermin. So the gardeners could start the whole process over again next season.

When planting Gladioli Bulbs space the bulbs about 8-15cm apart and plant the Gladioli Bulbs about 10-15cm deep with the pointed end facing upwards. By planting the Gladioli Bulbs deeply it will reduce the need for staking. Gladioli prefer a sunny well drained position will not tolerate wet feet. Add a layer of mulch over the soil to keep the soil moist always but not saturated.

From the planting of the Gladioli Bulb to flowering it should take between 90-120cm days depending on the weather. Once the Gladioli starts to flower you need to make sure the soil around the Gladiolus is kept moist.

Some of the Gladiolus you could start a garden in Western Queensland include the following.

- Gladioli Apricot Dream Apricot flowers with pale yellow centres.
- Gladioli Candyman Deep pink flowers.
- Gladioli CWA 1956 Bright orange flowers.
- Gladioli Dreams End Light orange flowers with large yellow centres.
- Gladioli Monto Hospital Bright yellow ruffled flowers with bright orange edge.
- Gladioli Purple Flora Dark purple flowers.
- Gladioli Sunset Splash Pale yellow flowers with bright orange throat.
- Gladioli Tambo Pink Large pink flowers.
