With another year upon us I thought it would be an appropriate time to share my reflections of the accomplishments of Council so far this term. Leading into the new year I like to reflect on what has been achieved and what are the plans for the year ahead. There have been some changes and good outcomes for the community and our organisation. In this edition of the Banter I will summarise these reflections and plans for 2023.

Finance - Completion of the external Audit has improved significantly over the past 3 years.

- Implementation of a structure capital project analysis and decision tool.
- Implementation of a Customer Service Charter.
- Implemented Risk Management Framework.
- Continues reduction in outstanding rates balance, working with property owners across the region.
- Barcoo was a runner up for a Risk Management award that is hosted by LGMS each year.
- Continuation of the Business Improvement program in partnership with the Queensland Treasury Corporation (QTC). This program has seen Council improve its financial position from one of at a critical risk level into one that, while still fragile, is much more stable and is more closely aligned to the financial sustainability framework.

Corporate Plan – About 18 months ago, Council adopted its new Corporate Plan (2021 – 2026) using extensive community consultation. The Plan is our principal planning document and informs the development of our annual budgets.

External Funding – With such a low rates base, Council is dependent on securing project specific funding for critical community infrastructure and services:

- Connemarra Bridge replacement \$500k
- Jundah Winton Rd floodway upgrades x 2 \$500k
- Trafalgar and Haughton Vale floodways \$720k
- McPhellamys Crossing \$1.1M, yet to be completed
- Jundah roadhouse drainage \$100k
- Entire Shire flood damage 2020-2022 \$25M
- Town streets reseals \$320k
- Windorah kerb and channel Maryborough St and Virtue St \$600k, \$300k of this was Council contribution
- Jundah SES shed \$120k
- Windorah water treatment plant \$2.4M
- Jundah water treatment plant planning \$248k January March 2023
- Jundah water treatment plant treated water storage replacement \$330k February 2023
- Budgerygar floodway \$500k June-July 2023
- Bimerah Isisford Rd stabilisation/resheet \$5M, \$1M of this Council contribution June July 2023
- Windorah Airport runway upgrade \$2.8M September December 2023
- Jundah staff housing \$1.5M July 2023
- Jundah Winton Rd at Mayne channel floodway extension \$550k August 2023

Economic Development – As part of our community survey just under two years ago, the community provided us with a very strong message that you wanted Council to put more emphasis on the development of our economy. Here are some initiatives we have put in place:

- Council is now a member of the state Small Business Friendly Council initiative which commits us to certain standards.
- Home Grown Employment Program enhances opportunities for locals wanting to secure employment within Council or local businesses.
- Small Business Advisory Service advice and support for local businesses.

MAYOR'S

Jundah Roadhouse – The last year or so has seen the Roadhouse grow in sales and become more efficient. A greater range of products and the introduction of solar power to the site have been part of this change.

The following is the externally funded project status update:

- Windorah water treatment plant in operation.
- McPhellemy's crossing Due to recent wet weather event delays to be expected.
- Mt Felix floodway Project on hold due to weather.
- Ray Paynter culvert/floodway pipe extension in the new year.
- Stonehenge water treatment plant new shed and filter upgrade filter upgrade remaining

The following is an update of our work crews and their progress on roads around the Shire. Darren Matheson's crew have returned to work from break and completed flood damage on Carella Rd and Stonehenge River Rd, from here they will move onto Lochiel Rd. Jason Beilby's crew have returned from break and are continuing Windorah Bedourie Rd at Morney.

The maintenance grader is currently doing emergency work for flood damage of various roads throughout the Shire. If there are sections of roads requiring immediate attention, please notify Council.

Contractor crew have completed flood damage on South Galway Rd and will move onto shoulder maintenance on the Bedourie Rd.

Don't forget, Council meetings are open to the public and all community members are welcome. Council meetings are rotated around the three towns, and we notify via an online flyer of upcoming Council meeting dates and times. The next meeting will be held in Jundah on the 15th of February 2023.







New 5,000 litre firefighting skid On display for feedback and design improvement.

RFSQ A/Chief Officer Joanne Greenfield wants to know what you want Rural Fire to look like into the future.

CRFSQ A/Chief Officer Joanne Greenfield wants to know what you want Rural Fire to look like into the future and new the 5,000 litre firefighting skid will be on display for feedback and design improvement. This is a great opportunity for both truck and non-truck brigades and local government to have their voices heard at the beginning of the process of building a new Rural Fire Service that will support brigades in defending Queensland communities.

Jundah – Tuesday 14th February – 10.30am – Jundah Rural Fire Brigade Station New Equipment - 5,000 litre firefighting skid tour

The Rural Fire Service has 3,700 x 500L slip-ons in service and about 400 x 1,000L trailers. These are great so long as you have people who can put them on their personal vehicles as it gives an immediate knockdown ability at fires and maintains control of the fires in the hands of the locals who understand how fire moves through their country. This is why 60% of Rural Fire Brigades in Queensland don't have a truck and most don't want one.

Brigade membership as a percentage of population is still constant however with depopulation in the central west and far west there are fewer people. If we keep supplying the same small units we will have fewer actually on the fire front. When they need to go refill, the fire gets a run. The proposed system and associated equipment that allows the local brigades to stay on the fire front longer is the supply of 5,000L skid units. These would are being user tested in February 2023 in the central west.

Units would be located at select rural fire stations and / or council depots, and at the commencement of fire season local brigade members who participate will bring in a flatbed truck and have the 5,000L skid loaded onto their truck. This will then be a resource to either fill up the local slip-on units or to knock down the flanks of a fire. This would not result in a reduction in slip-ons or trailers, rather be an additional resource.

At the end of fire season the brigade member will then bring the 5,000L skid in, and the RFSQ will have the equipment serviced and safely stored under cover against the next time of identified need. At the LGAQ Annual Conference in Cairns the RFBAQ spoke to a number of Mayors and Councillors regarding the concept and they were very keen to get involved. Nu Tank in Rockhampton have been very involved in the build and in seeing a central Queensland manufacturer building firefighting equipment for central Queensland users. This is a 100% RFBAQ driven and funded initiative from art union ticket sales and donations.

GARDENING WITH FISHERS NURSERY

AUSTRALIA DAY PLANTS

All Australians should do their very best, on one day a year to replant an Australian native plant. But finding true Australian native plants is becoming very difficult these days. While nurseries and the hardware chains may stock 100s of Australian native hybrids but there is a great weekend adventure to find some true Australian native plants. To help with that Australia Day plant selection here are some highly recommended Australian native plants:

Acacia podalyriifolia or Mount Morgan Silver Wattle is a delightful, fast growing small tree growing to 3-4m x 2-3m. With rounded silvery/grey foliage and clusters gold ball-type flowers massed over the plant in winter. In a home garden situation, this plant prefers a sunny well-drained position and a westerly aspect.

Brachychiton bidwillii is a Miniature Kurrajong that grows very well in local gardens and can reach a height of around 3m. During spring bunches of large bell-shaped pink flowers, clustered around the branches, will make this plant a feature in most gardens.

Callistemon chisholmii or Budgeroo is regarded as one of the most drought tolerant Bottlebrushes. This hardy shrub forms an slender sparse habit will grow between 2-4m. 8cm long golden tipped red flowers appear from May to October. It has leathery, dark green lance-shaped leaves make this plant resilient to frost and wind. Callistemon chisholmii can be found growing naturally creek banks in the sandstone country in Central and North Western Queensland.

Cassia artemisioides or Silver Cassia is a small, rounded shrub 2m x 1.5m with fine silvery blue/grey foliage. Bright yellow cup-shaped flowers will cover this plant during Winter and Spring. It requires a sunny, well-drained position and is a very attractive shrub.

Eremophila maculata Aurea or Yellow Spotted Emu Bush is a dense shrub with dark green foliage and yellow fuchsia like flowers. The Yellow Spotted Emu Bush is probably one of the hardiest shrubs for well-drained gardens that you can possibly buy. Whether you are gardening on Great Keppel Island or on a property west of Longreach, this is one shrub that you will grow successfully.



Grevillea pteridifolia or Fern Leaf Grevillea is a large shrub to small tree that also has attractive greyish-green foliage. The flowers contain a lot of nectar that is an important food source for a number of species of birds and animals. What many gardeners may not realise is that this plant is also the parent of a number of popular Grevillea hybrids. Hybrids like Grevillea Honey Gem and Sandra Gordon.

Hakea purpurea is a dense shrub growing to 2m high, and up to 2m wide. With its needle-shaped leaves, even when without flower, it can be a very ornamental feature of the garden. Once this shrub starts flowering, usually from late June to October, it would one of the most spectacular native shrubs growing in a winter garden. Each individual spider-type flower is approximately 2.5cm long, generally in clusters of several hundred at a time, almost engulfing the plant in flower.

Melaleuca laterita or Robyn Red-Breast is a small upright shrub 1.5m x 1m with bright green foliage. The flowers are as the common name states bright orange in colour, but there are variations in colour shades. The Bottlebrush like flowers are up to 8cm long and can appear throughout the year. For maximum growth a sunny well-drained spot is required.

All of these Australian native plants would well make a spectacular garden, so check with your local nurseries and the hardware chains so source your dinky-di, ridgy didge, Aussie Aussie Aussie, fair dinkum Australia Day plant.


Annuals - Marigolds, Salvia, Petunia, Alyssum, Candytuft, Cineraria, Clarkia, Cornflower, Delphinium, Dianthus Gypsophila, Larkspur, Linaria, Lobelia, Pansy, Phlox, Poppy, Primula, Snapdragon, Statice, Stock, Sweet Pea, Verbena and Viola.

Vegetables and Herbs - Beans, Beetroot, Broccoli, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Carrot, Celery, Lettuce, Mint, Mustard, Parsley, Radish, Squash, Silverbeet, Tomato and Zucchini and all herbs.
