
WITH SALLY O'NEIL CONTINUED

As we come to the end of this financial year it's time to reflect on our financial position, some have asked the question "was it all that bad back in 2020?".

When you elected me as your Mayor in 2020 I set about working with my fellow Councillors and senior staff at Council to better understand Councils financial position. It was clear that maintaining the financial sustainability of this Council was in some jeopardy. We saw that the budgets for upcoming years relied heavily upon dipping into Councils cash reserves. Not for new projects but to maintain our business. I authorised the engagement of the Queensland Treasury Corporation (QTC) to assist Council in improving its financial awareness and ensuring that financial factors were considered in every aspect of Council business.

QTC provided us with information as shown in the graph below. It indicates councils unrestricted cash position or, money that we have to spend on projects. Under current state government guidelines Council is expected to maintain a minimum of 4-6 months cash cover or approximately \$5.3M. This is to ensure if there is no revenue Council has sufficient funds to maintain its operations.

The red line below in the graph indicates the concerning issue with Councils financial position that the Councillors and I were faced with. Our cash was eroding quickly over the next several years. We needed to find a solution to ensure that Council was able to deliver its core business and at the same time provide for the future generations. The Councillors and I made a decision to make finance the cornerstone of our decision making. This meant we set about a program of maintenance and repair to existing assets rather than building new and maximised our efforts to seek external funding. The Windorah water treatment plant is a great example of that program. Clearly what has been established is that this Council is now in a strong financial position and we are being sort out by the Qld Government and other Councils asking that we share our story of success with them.



This Council does not have the large rate base of many other Councils and as such it's important for the Councillors and I to keep an eye on the ball. Improved financial reporting on a monthly basis is presented to Council and available to all on Councils website through agendas and minutes.

Improved governance across Council operations has resulted in improved performance without significant job losses. Councillors and I now consider the work we deliver as an obligation of service to the community, and we work with senior staff to drill down on every cost associated. This has meant that Council is able to provide services in the most cost-effective manner possible. The program that Councillors and I have been working on for the past three years is now business as usual for Barcoo Shire Council. It remains my commitment to ensure that this Council has the financial sustainability and security to be able to provide to the people of the Barcoo Shire.

The following is the externally funded project status update:

- Windorah water treatment plant 12-month liability period has commenced
- McPhellemy's crossing Expecting to return crews in the coming months
- Mt Felix floodway Project complete
- Ray Paynter culvert/floodway scheduled to be completed before June 30
- Floodway Yaraka Retreat Rd near Trafalgar scheduled to be completed before June 30
- Budgerygar floodway due to commence early July
- Stonehenge water treatment plant new shed and filter upgrade plans are being finalised with procurement commencing

The following is an update of our work crews and their progress on roads around the Shire. Darren Mattheson's crew have relocated to Stonehenge and completing flood damage on Hillview Rd and will then move onto the Nildes Jump up to carry out rehabilitation. Jason Beilby's crew have completed Windorah Bedourie Rd at Morney, they are now doing a resheet on the Birdsville Rd 24km from the Morney intersection.

The maintenance grader is currently doing maintenance on the Tenham Rd. If there are sections of roads requiring immediate attention, please notify Council.

The Contractor Crew are doing flood damage between Warbreccan and Mutti. Flying gang have started the main roads sign upgrade on the Windorah Birdsville Rd.

Don't forget, Council meetings are open to the public and all community members are welcome. Council meetings are rotated around the three towns, and we notify via an online flyer of upcoming Council meeting dates and times. The next meeting will be held in Jundah on the 21st of June2023.


INFORMATION CENTRES & LIBRARIES

Jundah - 236 Stonehenge - 417 Windorah - 415




Wild Dog Baiting Program

The Barcoo Shire Coordinated Wild Dog Baiting Program is being undertaken from 29 May – 12 June 2023 on properties within the Barcoo Shire. Council will be aerial baiting as well as some ground baiting during this time.

Visitors and local community members are to be vigilant with their pets during baiting periods and take caution whilst travelling around the Shire. 1080 baits can remain active for long periods on properties adjacent to main roads and other road networks within the Shire boundary.

Be aware of the possibility that these baits can be transferred by wildlife from baited areas to non-baited areas such as our town commons, reserves, and road related areas. Please ensure you do not take your pets onto private property without first contacting the owner/manager.


COMMUNITY NOTICES





Geoscience Australia is conducting a reflection seismic survey in Queensland as part of the Data Driven Discoveries program. The survey will pass through areas near Blackall, Charleville, Jericho, Yaraka and Adavale.

Most of the survey will be carried out along public roads between April to August 2023. This will involve a number of heavy and light vehicles working within the road corridor. No lasting ground disturbance or damage to infrastructure is anticipated. Permissions to access any private tracks have been sought directly with landholders.

GARDENING WITH FISHERS NURSERY

PLOTS OF COLOUR

Now that the season has changed and the heat of summer has gone. It is time to start looking at those areas of the garden that need to be brightened up. This time of the year in Western Queensland always has cascade of colour from small garden plots, hanging baskets or planter pots.

A patch of colour in any garden is a delight to everyone that views it and a great reward to the person that has created the garden. It is also an opportunity to create colour displays on a balcony, patio or other sunny living areas. This can be achieved by planting beautiful flowering annuals in containers. Whether they be simple pots, decorative urns, or window planter boxes, containers are perfect for growing flowering plants at any time of the year. They are also good for providing a low maintenance solution to brightening up a courtyard or patio area. Growing plants in containers can also provide a much-needed activity for children, providing both the thrill of watching the plant grow and the responsibility of maintaining the plant.

There are many varieties of colourful annuals available at your local nursery suitable for container planting. When considering what type of annual to select, the first question to ask is which annual will provide the most vivid floral display in my garden?







A favourite flowering annual of mine is the Petunia, which will offer a wide range of colours either in fashionable or bright mixes or in separate colours. One more variety of Petunia released a few years ago that will make a colourful living mulch or fantastic cascading pot display is Petunia Songbird is a collection of compact, bushy plants with large, lightly ruffled flowers. Unlike other large flowering Petunias, they have an excellent weather tolerance and recover quickly after heavy rain. Songbird will fill your garden with masses of blooms, in a large variety of colours, such as deep blue, crimson, white, pink, rainbow, rose, burgundy, yellow, orange and blue ice.

Another Petunia that is perfect for our local area is Petunia Avalanche. It is a spreading Petunia that is perfect for large pots and garden beds. Petunia Avalanche grows to around 80cm wide and bears masses of single flowers, in colours of white, red, salmon, lavender, lilac, pink or rose pink.



GARDENING WITH FISHERS NURSERY







This time of year Snapdragons, Pansies and Violas all provide excellent displays in pots. At the moment there are so many new releases to look out for at your local nursery. If you would like to make bold statement in the garden or in pots new release Pansy Whiskers could be the plant. Pansy Whiskers have traditional clear flower face colours crossed with a unique veining pattern that create the whiskers image. With flowers colours of orange, yellow, white, light blue, purple/white and red/gold.

One of the most unique new release flowering annuals would have to be Viola Tiger-Eye. This selection of viola displays small yellow blooms with black veins radiating from the centre, just like a tiger's eye. The other interesting Viola release is Viola Raspberries & Cream. It has a distinct floral display of pink-rose shades amongst a white face. Shading colours can vary with temperature from a soft pink to a more defined deep rose in cooler climates.

Once potted, these plants should be kept out of windy spots, as moisture will evaporate more quickly. Avoid very shady spots as well, as most summer annuals need plenty of sun. A handy hint to remember when planting your seedling, a good potting mix is important. I would recommend one that is well balanced, light and easy draining and I would include a slow release fertiliser and water retention granules. While most flowering annuals need watering, the flowers are easily damaged when sprayed too heavily with water. Remember though, a feed of a soluble fertiliser every couple of weeks will be needed to keep the flowers coming.
